Welcoming Children By Fr. Rick Bolte

When we get together as a family, what a joy (and rarity it can be) when the whole family is there. It's especially a joy to see the newborn children and the enthusiastic youngsters. We would never dream of telling family members to stay away because their babies might cry or their children might be too energetic. We want out families to be together whenever possible.

In our parish family at Mass, parents try to prevent their children from being too disruptive by quieting them in their pew or moving to the gathering space. Just like we would at our biological family gatherings, we want to encourage every family to be with us despite any distractions their children might cause. We want to be supportive and understanding of the struggle it can be to keep children from being too noisy or rambunctious. As many of us know, getting children properly dressed and to church on time is often a serious struggle. Fearing disgruntled looks and comments can make it feel not worth the effort.

As you may know, our school serves students with a variety of abilities. We understand that every child is unique, and our goal is to appreciate individuals with different talents and abilities. We provide additional support for learning in certain areas and encourage excellence in others at our school, fostering an environment of empathy and understanding for all our students.

We also expect families with children at our school to join us for our weekend Eucharistic celebrations. During Mass, it can be difficult to notice the differences among children. For example, an older child might be expected to sit quietly and pay attention, but this may not always be the case. It's easy to judge the parents as inattentive or ineffective at disciplining their child. However, unless we have personally dealt with a child with special needs, such as difficulty sitting quietly or maintaining attention throughout the entire Mass, we may not fully understand the situation.

As a parish family, we want to welcome all of our parish family and not just those who conform to our expectations. Sure, we can be distracted. However, it's crucial not to let a child's behavior disturb us, provoke us to anger, or act in such a way as to make a family feel unwelcome.

Jesus tells us that his family is made up of those who seek to do the will of His Father. God's family is composed of people of all types. To be a welcoming community, we should start by assuming that each of us is doing our best to follow Christ. In that spirit, let's welcome one another with patience and understanding, just as Christ welcomes us. This reassurance of support and understanding is what makes our parish a true family.



However, while we encourage you to continue to support our pantry, we also want to call your attention to our stores. The stores are operated by the SVDP Council for the diocese. They also depend on your support for donations and volunteers.

The stores have two functions that are important to you.

First, the stores are a place for you to bring usable items to donate for those in need. As you clean closets or change out your wardrobe, consider donating those items to one of the St. Vincent de Paul stores.

The Council provides local conferences with vouchers that Volunteers provide to our neighbors so they can shop for things that they need.



Call (859) 301-WELL (9355) to schedule an appointment.

- Peripheral Arterial Disease screenings look for abnormalities in blood flow in the lower extremities.
- Carotid Artery screenings check the arteries uneven right alignment in the neck where plaque buildup can lead to blockages, which are the No. 1 cause of stroke.
- Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm screenings search for an enlargement or uneven right alignment aneurysm in the abdominal aorta that could lead to a ruptured aortic artery.
- Cardiac Age Health Risk Assessment, based on the Framingham Heart Study, calculates a 10-year heart risk percentage based on biological age, body mass index, blood pressure, cholesteral, glucose and smaking. It requires a 4-hour fast and involves a finger stick glucose and lipid panel.

St. Timothy 2024 Mission Trip

Hi! My name is Maria Brockman. I am a junior at NKU and a parishioner here at St. Timothy. Two weeks ago, by God's grace and through the generous financial donations of many parishioners, I was given the opportunity to travel to Dover, Delaware for a mission trip with a group from our parish.

Our group of 28 attendees (plus Janice, a dedicated service dog) ranged in age from incoming 8th graders to adults. Despite nearly all of us belonging to St. Timothy, each one of us met someone new on the trip.

Our adventure began on Saturday, in the early afternoon, when we met in church's parking lot to depart. Before long, we were cruising down the road single-file. We drove till late that night and eventually stopped in Hancock, Maryland at St. Peter Church, which had graciously agreed to put us up for the night. Fr. Jack was waiting when we arrived, and promptly showed us to the classrooms we slept in. Since all of us were exhausted, we quickly got ready for bed and turned out the lights. Unfortunately, we soon came to realize the lighting system used motion sensors in most of the rooms, so the lights popped on numerous times in the few hours we had to sleep. In the morning, after celebrating Mass with St. Peter parish, we were back on the road, excitedly anticipating our arrival in Dover. Upon arriving at Holy Cross Church and School, we set up our belongings in our assigned classrooms and went off to the camp's evening program, at which we thanked God for our safe travels and received our assigned jobs for the week. We then celebrated Mass as one big mission group.

Throughout the week, we worked at a variety of locations. The group I was placed in worked with Habitat for Humanity. Habitat was thrilled to have a group of young adults volunteering. They told us the average age of their

usual volunteers was mid-70s. We mostly put vinyl siding on several new houses, but we also learned how to put up scaffolding. The other groups stayed busy too. They painted, power washed, mulched, weeded, and even replaced a deck and a floor for disabled and elderly homeowners. With temperatures in the mid-90s, perseverance was a big theme throughout the week.

On the last night at work camp, the homeowners were invited to the evening program to share how they were impacted by the help they received. It was clear how overwhelmingly grateful they were. Several of them commented that they were so inspired that a group of teenagers would give a week of their summer break to serve complete strangers. It was amazing to hear their stories!

While helping the residents was so meaningful, another huge aspect of the trip was the camp/retreat part. Every morning, after breakfast, we celebrated Mass together. Every evening, after we had gotten back from our work sites and eaten dinner, we participated in praise and worship. We spent time in Eucharistic Adoration and were given the opportunity to go to confession. And, as the cherry-on-top, several nights we broke off separately as parishes and discussed where we were seeing God, how we were being impacted, and the importance of the sacraments in every Catholic's life.

During the time we were working and traveling, singing and dancing, and praying and praising, our group bonded. Coming back home to Northern Ky., we are closer than before. We carry lots of fun new memories with us and a new zeal for sharing Christ's love with others. We are also more grateful for what we have, especially the good coffee we left at home.

Thank you to all who prayed for us and to those who funded our trip! We appreciate your support!



Catechetical Institute Free Online Classes



If you are looking for a way to strengthen your Catholic knowledge, check out the Franciscan University's Catechetical Institute. This is a free resource given to us by the Diocese.

Use this link - https://Franciscanathome.com/diocese-covington and click on the big blue button at the bottom right of the screen stating that your Parish has already registered. Under "New to Franciscan at Home?" click on Create New Account. Once you have entered all the *required information for your account, the next step is to Sign Up for Free through your Institution by selecting Diocese of Covington and St. Timothy Parish and School as the Institution.

- There are some great online classes available to you.
- The classes are laid out in segments, 6 to 10 per class.
- You can print a supporting page for the complete class, watch a video (6-11 minutes usually) then
 reflect on it, and write in an answer to the activity for that video.

The topics are listed as tracks, with options like the Sacraments, Eucharistic Renewal, Parenting, Marriage Renewal, Theology of the Body, etc. Tracks are offered in English, Spanish and many other languages.

Each track may have 2 or more classes, and most classes have 6 to 10 video segments.

I have enjoyed these classes, and recommend them if you have the time and inclination. Please let me know if you have trouble signing in, or want direction on a good class choice, or have any questions.
