### A Time of Generosity By Fr. Rick Bolte

The time roughly between Halloween and Christmas is a time when people's generous spirit shines most brightly. Most churches, civil organizations, and many assorted groups of people take up various collections at this time of year. Canned goods and other food items, clothing, baby items, Christmas gifts, and cash are all collected more at this time of year than any other time.

Food pantries, soup kitchens, shelters, and other non-profits who help out the poor or otherwise disadvantaged have their shelves filled. It is not unusual for people to have to call around to find an agency that is willing to take what is being collected. Even non-profits call each other at times offering to share what they have because their shelves and storage areas can hold no more.

There are a lot of warm feelings connected with this time of year. We know it is a time to be thankful for all we have and we show our thankfulness by being generous. It's a time of gift giving; we get caught up in giving gifts, often more than planned, to family and friends and buy gifts for those in need at the same time. The stores know how to stoke those feelings of warmth by playing Christmas music. TV stations and radio stations know that we respond to these feelings and have Christmas specials and 24/7 Christmas music interspersed with commercials appealing for your donations.

Should we really give in to this "time of giving?" The feelings of Christmas do come and go. All those agencies who aid the poor and disadvantaged will tell you after Christmas the giving drops off precipitously. In a few months they are begging for gifts as their shelves grow empty. What's the point of this one time of year to be generous?

Paul tells us that Jesus said, "It is better to give than to receive." Acts 20:35. When we

give at Christmas, it is a hope that we will get beyond the sentimentality of the season and learn the value of giving. Jesus' statement makes no sense in a world where we try to make ourselves happy by buying ourselves things and being able to afford to go places that cater to us in various ways. Our world's values tell us if we could just have a little more, if we could afford to do this or that; then we would be happy. And if we want to make others happy and have them love us, we have to give to them in the same way. Whatever we have, is never enough; we need still more.

Is it really better to give than to receive? 2 Corinthians 9:6-7 tells us that God loves a cheerful giver. How can we be cheerful in giving away what is supposed to make us happy? If we are able to take time to reflect and pray during this special season, we will discover how good it is to give. There is a sense deep within our being that makes us feel good when we give without strings attached. It's not just a sentiment but an affirming feeling that acknowledges the goodness deep within us. It is a sense that we have touched a good that is in us but beyond us; we've encountered the presence of God!

If we can get beyond all the sentimentality of this season and be in touch with that ultimate goodness deep with in us, our desire to be generous will not fade. The more we recognize that deep affirmation of our own goodness, the more we become the cheerful giver. We will know that it truly is better to give than to receive. It is more deeply affirming to know our own goodness and connection to God than to have something for ourselves. In this season of giving, which we often allow to be so busy, we will need to choose to take time to pray and reflect on our gift giving.

### **View from the Pew**

Sometimes we all need a break. Life is messy and chaotic and exciting and challenging and lonely and full of things that are unfair. Sometimes a short getaway can be recharging and refocusing in a way that feels like we were away for much longer than it actually worked out to be. Taking the long way home some days is nice and can end up being the breath of fresh air that we need and are seeking in the middle of our daily life. I have found more peace than I could have ever imagined by taking the path less traveled.

Did you know we have a path less traveled right here at St Tim's? Seriously! There's an actual gravel path that begins at the end of the rectory driveway, right near the basketball goal that would lead us to believe that Fr Rick and Fr Michael are sometimes out shooting some hoops.



This gravel path meanders around and passes to the left of the rectory greenhouse and leads up to a beautiful memorial for Ella-Reid Mason and what some people know as the entrance to Fr. Rushman's Garden of



Gratitude and to the barn. Did you know the path actually goes farther than that? You can actually drive all the way around the entire barn. Yes—YOU!

Once the gravel road turns and begins to lead up towards the barn doors there is plenty of grass parking on the left before you get to Ella's memorial, which on it's own is a peaceful and beautiful place to visit in the summer as the wind gently blows and flowers are everywhere. If you or someone with you has any physical challenges I would encourage you to drive around the right side of the barn and park your vehicle back near the fire pit. That's right—A FIRE PIT! Did you know WE had one of those?!

Let this path less traveled lead you to the back left corner area of the barn, no matter where you park. In that area you will find another path that leads into some woods. It is the ultimate path less traveled at St. Timothy but you can change that. And that path can change you.

That path into a small area of woods leads you to the edge of our property and safely brings you back towards your church. That path contains an outside Stations of the Cross. Why would you want to go there? The reasons can be many. When the storms of life are raging and your suffering is real, making the Stations of the Cross is a powerful way to enter into the mystery of Jesus' gift of himself to us. It allows you to take a spiritual pilgrimage into the sights of Jesus' last few hours of his life. This spiritual pilgrimage reminds us we are not alone in our struggles. Jesus chose to embrace every aspect of human life, including suffering and death.

Walking this path less traveled can be for you. You are ready. You have the tools already--believe it or not. Doing the stations takes around 30 minutes. Each station is numbered and has a brief description above a picture.

The easiest way to do them is to bring your smartphone and use this link that I have found useful:

No smartphone or no desire to use it? Simply read the description at the top of each station then talk directly to Jesus about what that moment must have been like for him. Say an Our Father, a Hail Mary and the Glory Be. And, "May the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, Rest in peace. Amen." Move on to the next station.


When you are finished feel free to rest on the hand-hewn benches that surround our brick firepit and be proud of the spiritual pilgrimage you just completed—and your deeper connection to Jesus.

May you find the peace you seek in the storms of life in your outdoor Stations journey with Jesus. He will be with you. He suffered for each of us and knows our pain. Let St Tim's path least traveled be just what you need when you need it. Go to him in your storms—you can't mess it up—I PROMISE. You can do it. You are ready.

### **Catechetical Institute Free Online Classes**



If you are looking for a way to strengthen your Catholic knowledge, check out the Franciscan University's Catechetical Institute. This is a free resource given to us by the Diocese.

Use this link - https://Franciscanathome.com/diocese-covington and click on the big blue button at the bottom right of the screen stating that your Parish has already registered. Under "New to Franciscan at Home?" click on Create New Account. Once you have entered all the \*required information for your account, the next step is to Sign Up for Free through your Institution by selecting Diocese of Covington and St. Timothy Parish and School as the Institution.

- · There are some great online classes available to you.
- The classes are laid out in segments, 6 to 10 per class.
- You can print a supporting page for the complete class, watch a video (6-11 minutes usually) then
  reflect on it, and write in an answer to the activity for that video.

The topics are listed as tracks, with options like the Sacraments, Eucharistic Renewal, Parenting, Marriage Renewal, Theology of the Body, etc. Tracks are offered in English, Spanish and many other languages.

Each track may have 2 or more classes, and most classes have 6 to 10 video segments.

I have enjoyed these classes, and recommend them if you have the time and inclination. Please let me know if you have trouble signing in, or want direction on a good class choice, or have any questions.



Thanks to your support we are now actively installing sandpoint wells and hand pumps on the Matebele Plain! And by "we" I mean our longserving Foreman, John Simasiku and his two assistants.


John has moved all materials to a cache in Kalenge Village, the site of our proof-of-concept in 2019 and Prof. Nyambe's home village. This staging will enable John to install as many wells as possible before the rains return. (The rain did not return last year, throwing Zambia into a national energy and food emergency.)

I hear from John at times when a rare cell signal is found. After one week in the bush he has installed 13 wells as of Sunday October 20, serving over one thousand people. John reports that "The people are starving for water and these pumps bring great happiness."

Volunteers with St. Vincent de Paul are committed to assisting individuals and families in our community who are in need. For many, it's a temporary situation, but for some it's a lifelong struggle.

Many people are looking for work, often in construction, food services, cleaning, and other industries. Work boots, jeans, and gloves are in short supply. Many of our neighbors do not have furniture and housewares. A donation of items that you don't use anymore would "do a little good."

St. Tim's Pantry feeds dozens of families each month with your generous food contributions. Somehow, when the shelves are almost bare, you always come through. We have never had to turn anyone away.

### EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS Needed - Will YOU Help "Feed the hungry?"

Perhaps it is because we are in the midst of the three year National Eucharistic Revival driving a renewed reverence for and in the Eucharist, but our parish is experiencing a growing demand from residents living in several senior living facilities to regularly receive the Eucharist.

Almost two years ago, we started holding weekly Communion services for the newly opened Legacy Living senior living facility. As that facility filled up, so too did the number of faithful increase in the weekly Communion services offered in their chapel. Several of our parishioners have since been volunteering to hold Communion services each Thursday since December, 2023.

For many years other parishioners have been visiting individuals in Colonial, Boonespring and Story Point. And two other facilities, Provision Living and Scheper Ridge, have residents asking to receive the Eucharist on a regular basis. This is a great blessing for our parish to bring Christ to those who wish to receive Communion as it is a blessing that so many are reaching out to receive the Eucharist. But, as we hear Jesus' words in Matthew's Gospel, "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few" (Matt. 9:38), we need trained Eucharistic Ministers to help "feed the hungry", those who wish to live their Catholic faith.

Because this ministry of supporting the faithful who are now living in several of these senior living facilities has grown so much, we need to coordinate our efforts to satisfy their needs. And we can only do that with Eucharistic Ministers from our parish willing to bring Jesus, Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity to those to who wish to receive Holy Communion.

If you are able to help in this growing ministry, please leave your name and contact information with Lynn Profitt in the Parish Office, and I will follow-up with you so we can satisfy the growing demand to receive the Eucharist.

### WHAT AMENDMENT 2 DOES NOT DO

Eliminate the General Assembly's constitutional obligation to adequately fund public schools or take money away from individual counties or rural schools

Close any public schools in the Commonwealth or decrease teacher pay

Require the state to adopt a certain type of school choice program

Increase government control or regulation over homeschool or private school instruction

Require parents or private schools to accept school choice resources

**EVERY STATE** surrounding **KY** has a school choice program.
