IMMIGRATION By Fr. Rick Bolte

There are many things that tend to polarize us as a nation; immigration is one of them. We hear immigrants described as criminals because many have come into our country illegally. We also hear highlighted anecdotal events implying greater criminality. We hear they cost tax payers money as they seek social benefits. On the other hand, we are told many of these people take jobs other Americans would not want and they are an essential part of our economy. We hear that the crime rate among immigrants is actually less than it is among citizens. We hear they pay income and SS taxes but will not be eligible for their benefits.

In writing this, I am not proposing to sort out those differences. However, with the election of Pope Leo, many have wondered about the church's position. Some have tried to relegate it to nothing more than a political opinion.

For the church to have a teaching that is in opposition to one political party or another is not new. For many years the church was know to be on the side of workers and their ability to unionize. More recently and ongoing is the church's teaching opposing abortion. The church's teaching on immigration is neither new nor a political opinion. In every case, the church calls us to respect human life from conception to natural death including living life with human dignity.

In the **Old Testament** we might recall the story of Abraham hosting three travelers. Turned out they were God's messengers telling him of the coming birth of Isaac. This is contrast in the next story where God tells Abraham of the coming destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah because of their lack of hospitality. In the **New Testament**, Jesus tells us to love our neighbor including the

Samaritan (an enemy) and to love others as He loves us.

Many Catholics suspect the current Pope Leo XIV picked his name wanting to follow the example of Pope Leo XIII. Leo XIII is known for writing "Rerum Novarum" (1891) in which he states: ""Rights must be religiously respected wherever they exist, and it is the duty of the public authority to prevent and to punish injury, and to protect everyone in the possession of his own. Still, when there is question of defending the rights of individuals, the poor and badly off have a claim to especial consideration." (#37) "Noone would exchange his country for a foreign land if his own afforded him the means of living a decent and happy life." (#47).

Pope Pius XII, Apostolic Constitution "Exsul Familia Nazarethana" (1952) writes, ""The migrant Holy Family of Nazareth, fleeing into Egypt, is the archetype of every refugee family. Jesus, Mary and Joseph, living in exile in Egypt to escape the fury of an evil king, are, for all times and all places, the models and protectors of every migrant, alien and refugee of whatever kind who, whether compelled by fear of persecution or by want, is forced to leave his native land, his beloved parents and relatives, his close friends, and to seek a foreign soil." (Introduction)

Saint Pope John XXIII, "Mater et Magistra" (1961) writes, ""[If] the whole structure and organization of an economic system is such as to compromise human dignity, to lessen a man's sense of responsibility or rob him of opportunity for exercising personal initiative, then such a system, we maintain,

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is altogether unjust—no matter how much wealth it produces, or how justly and equitably such wealth is distributed." (#83) "The solidarity of the human race and Christian brotherhood demand the elimination as far as possible of these discrepancies. With this object in view, people all over the world must co-operate actively with one another in all sorts of ways, so as to facilitate the movement of goods, capital and men from one country to another" (#155) He further states in "Pacem in Terris" (1963), ""Every human being has the right to freedom of movement and of residence within the confines of his own state. When there are just reasons for it, he must be permitted to emigrate to other countries and to take up residence there. The fact that he is a citizen of a particular state does not deprive him of membership to the human family, nor of citizenship in that universal society, the common, world-wide fellowship of men." (#25) "... [O]f its very nature, civil authority exists, not to confine its people within the boundaries of their nation, but rather to protect, above all else, the common good of the entire human family." (#98)

From **Vatican Council II**, Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World "Gaudium Et Spes" (1965) we read, ""In our times a special obligation binds us to make ourselves the neighbor of every person without exception, and of actively helping him when he comes across our path, whether he be an old person abandoned by all, a foreign laborer unjustly looked down upon, a refugee,...or a hungry person who disturbs our conscience by recalling the voice of the Lord, 'As long as you did it for one of these the least of my brethren, you did it for me'" (Matt. 25:40). (#27)

Pope Paul VI, "Populorum Progressio" (1967) writes, ""We cannot insist too much on the duty of giving foreigners a hospitable reception. It is a duty imposed by human solidarity and by Christian charity, and it is incumbent upon families and education institutions in the host nations...[T]hey should be welcomed in the spirit of brotherly love" (#67) "Emigrant workers

should also be given a warm welcome. Their living conditions are often inhuman, and they must scrimp on their earnings in order to send help to their families who have remained behind in their native land in poverty." (#69)

Saint Pope John Paul II, "Laborem Exercens" (1981) writes, ""Man has the right to leave his native land for various motives--and also the right to return--in order to seek better conditions of life in another country. This fact is certainly not without difficulties of various kinds. Above all it generally constitutes a loss for the country which is left behind. It is the departure of a person who is also a member of a great community united by history, tradition and culture; and that person must begin life in the midst of another society united by a different culture and very often by a different language. In this case, it is the loss of a subject of work, whose efforts of mind and body could contribute to the common good of his own country, but these efforts, this contribution, are instead offered to another society which in a sense has less right to them than the person's country of origin... "Every possible effort should be made to ensure that it may bring benefit to the emigrant's personal, family and social life, both for the country to which he goes and the country which he leaves. In this area much depends on just legislation, in particular with regard to the rights of workers. It is obvious that the question of just legislation enters into the context of the present considerations, especially from the point of view of these rights...(23)

Catechism ¶2241: "The more prosperous nations are obliged, to the extent they are able, to welcome the foreigner in search of the security and means of livelihood which he cannot find in his country of origin.

Please forgive the length of this article. I wanted to give as much as I dare a rich sampling of the church's teaching regarding immigrants. As Catholics we are called to not get caught up in the political hysteria but to truly be champions of human dignity without exception.




The tabernacle. Did you know that tabernacles have been in use for about 3,475 years? I can't even comprehend that amount of time. That's like going back 124 generations in your family according to HowManyGenerations.com.

Tabernacles can be traced back to the Mosaic Covenant in the Old Testament. Made on Mount Sinai, this covenant gave the Law and construction of the tabernacle as a place where God would manifest His presence among his people. The tabernacle was a physical representation of God's desire to be with Israel. Also known as the Old Covenant, it is a conditional covenant. This means God's blessings and protection were based on the Israelites obedience to the law He gave them. If they obeyed the law there would be blessings, if they disobeyed, there would be curses. Even when the Israelites fail. God's commitment to them remains. That IS love!

The Tabernacle originally was built in the wilderness about 1450 BC by the Israelites. They were commanded to build it so God could "dwell among them" (Exodus 26:46). They began using it after they were freed from Egyptian slavery and continued using it during their 40 years in the desert while conquering the land of Canaan. It was the first temple dedicated to God and the first resting place of the Ark of the Covenant.

Our current tabernacle was a generous gift from a deacon during our church renovation. He knew some of the Sisters of Notre Dame up in Kenwood and learned of an archive of old sacred vessels that they kept and protected. He was given access to the archive after sharing his desire to find one for our newly updated and refreshed sanctuary. He found one that he knew would be just perfect for St. Timothy, made a donation and it was brought to its new home here in Union. Somewhere along the way it was actually dropped and needed repair (not by the deacon!). Lucky for us it was able to be refreshed and repaired in time for the first Mass in our renovated space.



OCIA - What is That?

OCIA, the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults, is the process formally known as RCIA, the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. But why the change? The name change is primarily a translation update from the original Latin text. The term "order" emphasizes that Christian initiation is not a single event or "rite," but a series of rites reflecting a continuing journey of faith formation and spiritual growth. The program itself will continue as usual here at St. Timothy. (Except that we get better every year!)

OCIA is a process of conversion involving a series of classes that helps to prepare adults to receive the Sacraments of Initiation which include Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist.

I remember being a little apprehensive about going through the process of becoming Catholic. It took me many years to finally make the decision and when did, I loved it! I had such a great experience, and I keep coming back for more! I, along with the Team, want to help others have that same joyous experience. That is our goal here at St. Timothy.

Our classes begin on Sept. 7th and continue until Easter. Who are these classes for? Anyone who is interested in becoming Catholic, those who may have been away from the Church for a while and parishioners who would just like a little refresher of the faith – all are welcome!

Summer. A time to relax by the ocean or the pool. Time to contemplate chirping cicadas and the buzzing bees. You've binge watched as many movies and TV shows as you can stand. You find yourself tired of the Internet, frustrated with politics, impatient for football season (and school) to start. You may feel that life is less fulfilling than you would like.



The good news is, there is a solution, and you don't have to give up the beach or the cicadas or the bees.

Saint Vincent de Paul has a multitude of ways that you can use your time and talents to enrich your life, and the lives of others, for just a few hours a month.

"Whoever is generous to the poor lends to the Lord, and he will repay him for his deed." Proverbs 19:17

As a St. Tim SVDP Volunteer you'll find that opportunities abound.

SVDP Food Pantry

Volunteers are needed to help stock the shelves and prepare bags of groceries for those who need food. Times are flexible, the work is easy, and the company is fun and inspiring.

SVDP Call Center

The SVDP Call Center is located at the St. Vincent de Paul Thrift Store in Crestview Hills. Every day an average of 60 neighbors call St. Vincent de Paul for assistance. We need Volunteers to return calls and assist people with the application process.

Call Managers

Call managers take referrals from the Call Center, enter information into our computer system, and distribute assignments to SVDP Volunteers. Call managers Volunteer one day a week for a few hours.

Home Visits

We have Volunteer opportunities to engage directly with our neighbors who are seeking assistance. We assess their situation and provide direct assistance as well as referrals to other community agencies. Volunteers meet them in their homes, or at St. Tim's pantry, depending on the situation. We provide training and always visit in pairs. During these visits, we offer vouchers to our SVDP thrift stores for furniture, clothing, and housewares, and to the extent that our financial resources permit, we help people with rent or utilities - or gas money to get to work or to the doctor.

Thrift Stores

Volunteer help is needed each week to sort donations, create displays, and straighten and stock shelves at our four St. Vincent de Paul thrift stores. Of course, your donations of clothing, toys, housewares, and furniture are always appreciated.

Holiday Volunteer Opportunities

Our seasonal events would be not possible without the Volunteers who donate their time, treasure, and talent. These events require help before, during, and after to ensure everything runs smoothly.

Coat Distributions: Volunteers are needed for registration, sorting and stocking, as well as assisting families as they pick out winter coats. Coats are distributed at the Thanksgiving food distribution and at convenient locations.

Thanksgiving Food Distribution: Volunteers are needed to sort, bag, and carry food. This event is held the weekend before Thanksgiving at St. Tim's food pantry.

Christmas Food and Present Distribution: Like Thanksgiving, Volunteers are needed to sort and distribute Christmas toys for children, as well as sort, bag and carry food. This event is held the weekend before Christmas.
