2 Timothy By Fr. Rick Bolte

"Stir into flame the gift of God."

2 Timothy 1:6

This verse is not only our parish motto; it's also the inspiration behind the name 2 Timothy—a title suggested by a member of our Scripture study group for this mobile home.

I purchased this home with my retirement savings. Perhaps one day I'll live there myself. But its deeper purpose, and the one that truly stirs my heart, is that 2 Timothy might become a place of ministry — a place where faith is shared, friendships are born, and the flame of God's love is rekindled in unexpected ways.

Too often we think of ministry only as what we give to others—especially to those who have less. Yet real ministry is a two-way gift. Those with fewer material resources often have something profoundly spiritual to offer us: a deeper trust, a purer gratitude, a living faith tested by life's hardest realities.

When we dare to cross boundaries of comfort and class, we discover that we're not as different as we imagine. We meet people who, despite their hardships, are not defeated or joyless. In fact, their faith often burns brighter than our own. With little to shield them from life's storms, they lean fully on God—not a God who magically fixes every problem, but a God who walks with them through every trial.

Their faith is not rooted in prosperity, but in presence. And that presence gives them courage, strength, and joy even amid struggle. They remind us that God's goodness is not measured by comfort or success, but by the unshakable assurance that we are never alone.

2 Timothy sits quietly in the White Pine Mobile Park at 206 Whitfield, Florence. Yet it holds a great promise. You may soon hear about—or be invited to—opportunities to meet neighbors in our parish boundaries who may seem very different from us. I encourage you to say yes.

Come with open hearts. Come ready not only to serve, but to listen, to learn, and to be transformed. Together, may we truly "stir into flame the gift of God" that lives within us all.



View from the Pew

The **sanctuary candle**, also known as the sanctuary lamp, altar lamp, tabernacle lamp or Eucharsitic lamp is a flame that remains constantly lit near our tabernacle. It hangs from our ceiling almost behind where Fr. Rick or Fr. Mike sits during mass and is there to signify and honor the real presence of Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament.

In the bible, Leviticus 24:2-4 establishes the candle and reads, "Command the Israelites to bring your pure, pressed olive oil for the light, so that the lamps may be kept burning continually. Aaron is to tend the lamps before the Lord outside the curtain of the covenant. This is to be a lasting ordinance for the generations to come. The lamps on the pure gold lampstand before the Lord must be tended continually." Leviticus 24 is a direct command for the physical lampstand to be kept lit as a perpetual sign of God's presence in our sanctuary. Other references can also be found in Exodus 27:20-21, which commands that the lamp be kept burning always, and Matthew 5:15, which uses a candle on a stand as a metaphor for letting one's light shine.

The sanctuary candle and its continuous burning is a perpetual sign of Jesus' constant presence and a reminder to be aware of Christ's light in the world. It signifies that Jesus is physically present in the blessed hosts. It symbolizes that Jesus is the Light of the World-a source of salvation sent to guide humanity. It shows true burning love. The flickering flame can be a symbol of our mother church's burning love for Jesus AND a reminder of his promise to be with us always. It also continues an ancient tradition-linking us and our service all the way back to the Old Testament. Think of that!

Our candle is made of wax and burns for 14 days. That means that every 14 days someone from our parish

has to climb up on a chair and change it out for you and me—all to continue a 3,475ish year tradition.

This lamp shines before many altars. It is used in Jewish and Chrisitan places of worship. It can be found in Lutheran churches, Anglican churches, Methodist churches and Eastern Orthodox churches—ALL to indicate the presence of Christ in their sanctuary. For some reason I find that mind-blowing.

The sanctuary candle is lit to indicate the presence of Christ within our Tabernacle. It symbolizes Jesus and the faith of those who love Him, the inextinguishable light that remains lit for people who have strayed from the church and a promise of a safe place upon their return.

I challenge you to be more like this candle. As a Christian we should always be striving to align our life with Christ's life. Can you proclaim Christ to others? Can you be the light, sometimes the only light of Christ to someone? Remember—actions can speak louder than words my friends. Go be THE LIGHT as we head into the holiday season!!!

The Rite of Entrance into the Catechumenate and Welcoming of the Candidates

As the OCIA Coordinator at St. Timothy since 2020, the Team and I have realized that not all parishioners really understand the various Rites involved in the OCIA program. <u>We currently have 20 adults, 11</u> <u>teens and about 10 children all preparing to come into the church this Easter!</u> Hopefully this article will help you appreciate the process and support those seeking to enter into full communion in the church.

The Rite of Entrance into the Catechumenate and Welcoming of the Candidates will occur at the 9:30 Mass on Sunday, Nov. 30. This Rite is the beginning of the faith journey of those wishing to be received into the order of catechumen (those not baptized) or candidate (those who have been baptized in accordance with the Church). This ceremonial Rite begins with the catechumens and candidates waiting just outside the doors of the Church. After the opening song, entrance procession, and greeting, they begin knocking on the doors. This is symbolic of asking for help on this journey, seeking to become closer to Him, and knocking, and the door will be opened. At the invitation of our Pastor, Fr. Bolte, they enter and stand just inside the doors behind the baptismal font with their sponsors. Fr. Bolte invites the church community to welcome these catechumens and candidates, pray for them, and support them in their initiation into the Christian faith by Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist.

We, as parishioners, are obligated to share our faith according to our apostolic abilities. By celebrating this Rite during a Sunday Mass, we can encourage and support these catechumens and candidates on their faith journey and commitment to the Church.

Please help us support them and pray for them. It is a wonderful way to begin the season of Advent!

The St. Timothy Catholic School Community Opens New School Library

"I can do things you cannot, you can do things I cannot; together we can do great things." These words from Mother Teresa resonate deeply with the St. Timothy Catholic School community, which is celebrating the opening of a new school library, made possible by the collective effort and unwavering determination of its parents and parishioners.



Just three years after a major expansion with a new educational wing and gymnasium, the dream of a dedicated school library seemed financially out of reach. There were no spare rooms or funds available. Yet, the vision became a reality through the ingenuity of one dedicated parent and her community of friends who saw opportunity where others saw a storage problem: the two modular classrooms that temporarily housed kindergarten and first-grade students during the wing's construction.


More than a year and a half ago, these parents initiated a grassroots campaign that demonstrated the true meaning of Christian stewardship. They rallied a dedicated group of volunteers to transform the temporary modular spaces into a permanent, welcoming library and educational center.

The project was a testament to the community's generous spirit. Families, grandparents, and students responded to the call by donating their time and many gently used books, filling the new shelves with stories and knowledge. Community members and local businesses shared unused shelving and book bins, ensuring the space was organized and ready for eager young readers. Even local libraries and offices contributed gently used items, showcasing the generosity of the wider community.

The library's atmosphere is made even more special by the beautiful murals created by a very talented artist and a local craftsman. The colorful, whimsical artwork adorns the walls, transforming the space into a warm and inviting haven that inspires a love of reading.



This new space has already been met with excitement. Students have toured the library, and a new lending system is now in place. Soon, they will have the opportunity to check out books and continue their journey of becoming lifelong, faithful readers. The St. Timothy community has shown that with a little creativity and a lot of teamwork, they can indeed do great things.





Last year St. Tim's sponsored **80** families for Thanksgiving and Christmas. These are families that otherwise might have gone without. Throughout the year we provided **729** families **(2,522** individuals) with clothing, furniture, assistance with rent and utilities, and food from St. Tim's Pantry.

Last year there were **450** mostly new and gently used **winter coats** donated by parishioners. St. Vincent de Paul distributes the coats that are collected or bought by the Knights of Columbus. These coats are essential for people who, too often, are not prepared for winter weather.

The **Giving Tree** provides gifts that make tangible the joy of the season. Last year your generosity was over the top! As you might expect, with the growing need, we are hoping to serve even more families this year.

St. Vincent de Paul offers the opportunity to reach out to families throughout the year. Many have fallen on hard times and are in need of a comforting word, a little food, and a new direction. If this appeals to you, St. Vincent de Paul could use your help to occasionally visit neighbors, work in the food pantry, Call Center, or thrift stores - and make a personal contribution.


